

#### **How to Give Your Mac a Performance Boost**

### Why Is My Mac So Slow?

Remember the first time you started up your Mac? Hearing that lovely tone you thought would never get annoying and seeing the beautifully designed Apple-centric Boot Image. It sure was a special moment. But now the love you once felt is gone, and you spend a little too much time staring at the boot image rather than actually using your computer. It's true, over time your computer will slow down and stop working the way it once did.

There are many reasons why your computer will become slow over time, here are two of the most common:

#### Caching

Much like an automobile, your computer needs regular maintenance to keep it running at its peak-performance. The more you drive your car, the more "gunk" will build up in your engine. Over time, this "gunk" can impede the performance of the engine. The same applies for computers. To keep things running smoothly, your computer is constantly caching files. If this cache is never cleaned, over time it can become quite large, and eventually slow down your computer.

#### Hardware

As time progresses, computer programs become more and more powerful, while your computer does not. If you noticed that upgrading to Mountain Lion knocked the speed of your machine down a bit, this is because Mountain Lion is demanding more than what Lion did.

Rosetta: The deal-killer for many is the lack of Rosetta support—the technology that allows you to run PowerPC applications on an Intel processor. Rosetta isn't part of Mountain Lion and can't be added. If you have some old applications that you can't live without (AppleWorks, for example) you'll want to stay right where you are. I stopped using PowerPC applications years ago, understanding that the end was in sight for them, so this wasn't a problem for me.

If you do have a lot of PowerPC applications but don't use them, it's likely you'll see them cluttering up your Applications folder. They're doing no harm, but you might want to trash them to free up some space. They're denoted by a gray circle with a line through it (the universal sign for "nuh uh"). If you sort your applications by date created

most of them will float to the top of the list, making it easier to spot them.

The scrolling thing: With Lion, Apple reversed the scrolling direction so that it would match the direction on iOS devices. I find this more "natural" (as Apple terms it) on a trackpad, but it makes no sense to me with a mouse's scroll wheel. I've elected to put it back the way it was by disabling the natural scroll setting in the Trackpad and Mouse system preferences.

**Scroll bars:** Speaking of scrolling, scroll bars look different. Those clickable arrow icons above and below scroll bars are gone. And, depending on the input device you're using, scroll bars may not always be visible. You can make them visible at all times within the General system preference.

Todo is a relatively simple task manager for OS X and iOS. It has plenty of cool features and settings to play around with. With the reception of the OS X Reminders app, apps like this one are not needed as much. In any case, Todo support iCloud syncing as well as Dropbox, so give it a try.



#### Memo

Memo is an extremely simple sticky-note-like app that is available for OS X, and iOS. It syncs all your stickies with iCloud, so you will always have your little notes across all your devices.


